This painting started out as a demonstration for an art group simply to show a variety of techniques in flower painting - hence the wet into wet section of background at the top using waterdrops and salt.

There were just one or stems drawn in at the time. Later on I developed the composition more fully, adding additional stems, leaves and buds. All the components were then painted, using softer bluegreens for the leaves I wanted to portray as set back visually into the picture plane.

Next I needed to decide how dark to go with the background. It would have been very safe to stick to the softer tints for the whole, but I wanted to see if I could incorporate some rich darks for a bolder interpretation.

Using acrylic inks and watercolour, I started in the bottom right corner to establish the shadow areas first, then fanned outwards into the lighter areas, evaluating the overall effect as I went, working wet into wet.

The textures came from sprinkling salt , and flicking water drops from my finger tips into the wet paint. The sense of movement in the initial demonstration area was an important consideration for the whole. I then glazed over some of the foreground leaves with yellow to brighten them and strengthened the veining on the blue green leaves.

After using so much water for the background, I couldn't resist painting in a few actual water droplets as a final touch.





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
